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#### MUSHROOM DISCOVERY at SPVP with EXPERT, JR BLAIR On Saturday Dec. 1, from 10am to 12 noon, "comb the trails"



with J.R. Blair, the expert on mushroom identification who has impressed us with his knowledge and allowed us to help survey some of the macro fungus of our park. The magic of these fungi is that new species pop up in our Park each year.

J.R. Blair received his Master's degree in Conservation Biology focusing on mushroom taxonomy in 1999. Since then he has been a full-time lecturer in the Dep't of Biology at SFSU, teaching classes such as : World of Plants, Ornithology, Nature Study, Animal Diversity, & Human Biology. He is the present director



for the SFSU Field Campus near Yuba Pass in the Sierras & is active in the Mycological Soc. of SF & participates in Christmas bird counts for the Audubon Soc. (Deadly Amanita muscaria pictured at left)

#### HIMALAYAN BLACKBERRY FIGHT on the HAZELNUT TRAIL

On September's Habitat Restoration Day, Bing Huey and leader, Istvan Puski accepted the challenge of this ferocious interloper, pulling out long roots and stems, up to 30' of the flesh-tearing Himalayan Blackberry,





distinguished from our gently spined and more flavorful native by its weapon-like thorns and its extensive growth—up to <u>25 feet in a sea-</u> son. But the berries are prized by many and described by one person as: "so dark and swollen [they] glisten like the abdomen of a black widow spider."

This plant will easily grow back, crowding out our natives that nurture our insects (See pgs 10 & 11), finding fertile ground in such disturbed areas as these recently widened & cleared pathways. #### **CARMEN DOMINGO'S CHALLENGE**

It was a tense afternoon in September when Dr. Carmen Domingo, SFSU's dean of Sci. and Engineering, asked those gathered in the Visitor Center, "Which one is the



human embryo?" And she was only asking us to compare ourselves with a **fish**, **amphibian**, **bird** or other **mammal's** underdeveloped form. Sadly, many were perplexed, showing us that it



takes a while for an amazingly uniform ball of cells to differentiate into a recognizable being with *our* organ-systems. And we were confronted with the uncomfortable fact that we were looking at some pretty damn close relatives of ours. [Your test: Which image above is of a human embryo? *Answer on bottom of pg 4* 

Getting into the scientific intricacies, she discussed <u>the</u> <u>discovery of the "Organizer</u>" situated at the top of the growing cell ball that determines which cells will be destined to form our skin, or our muscles, or our digestive system. Then, in a reality check, based on mice experiments but sometimes seen in humans: if the Organizer is transplanted to a different location in a mouse, two heads could form, bringing forth some uncomfortable thoughts. Did you miss all the fun? See you at our next super-scientific offering? *If* you have the head for it.

#### TWO PACIFICA-GEARED PROGRAMS by Jim Steele

On Sept. 16, **Kathy Kellerman** shared the history of the Pacifica Land Trust & its successful efforts to acquire and/or restore undeveloped lands around Pacifica. We can thank the PLT for improvements at Mori Point, Pac.



State Beach & the Pedro Pt. Headlands. Along with the S.P. Creek Watershed Coalit'n, the PLT is now exploring how to best protect San Pedro Creek, protect homes from erosion,

prevent pollution & save its steelhead population.

On Sept.18, **David Behar**, the Climate Program Director, SF Public Utilities Comm. & **Jim Steele** discussed the uncertainties of sea level rise. David reported adaptation planning dependent upon sea level rise projections from official scientific organizations. However 5 official reports offering guidance all differed. Although each report projected rising sea level & some degree of acceleration, each report projected different rates of rise, making it difficult to determine the most effective adaptation plan.

Part of the uncertainty, as Steele pointed out, is the rate of sea level rise has naturally accelerated & decelerated during the 20th century, making it difficult to determine whether or not recent acceleration is natural or manmade. Adding to that uncertainty, all studies of the Greenland Ice Sheet reveal oscillating temperatures and degrees of meltwater that contribute to sea level. Greenland lost ice in the 30's, then stabilized or increased its ice sheet in the 70's-90's, followed by heavy melt similar to the 30'sfrom the late 1990's to 2012. However, since 2012 ice melt decreased, with slight ice gains over the last 2 yrs. To develop wise adaptation policies that are not too excessive or too lax, we need studies to disentangle natural vs human-caused sea level rise.

#### WELCOME TO SAN PEDRO PARK, RANGER TRAVIS HANSON

Now a ranger in District IV of San Mateo County Parks, **Ranger Hanson** started out building trails in the wilds of the Trinity Alps,

being off the electronic map for 6 mo. at a time, chasing hungry **bears** out of camp with his fellow men and women workers and relying on **mule** teams to bring in provisions. Later he built trails in the wilds of Kings Cnyn National Park. But when he worked for the Appalachian Mt Club, once again building trails, weather

showed up for Ron on the same trail on his butterfly hunt. On 10/14 on the WRR he saw **2 kinds of Cres**cents, many **Ringlets**, Lorquin Admirals and one Echo Blue. Good to see you back in action, Ron!

And from Laurie Nikitas: I've seen a **bobcat** in the Walnut picnic area twice, Oct 19 & 22. Both times it was at the edge of the meadow, about fifty feet from the picnic tables. Last time, it was so chill a covey of **quail** fed peacefully about 20 feet away. Lots of **baby lizards** this year—I've never seen so many before. Adults are getting scarcer as nights get colder. but the little guys are everywhere.

#### **FACTOID**



The California giant salamander, *Dicamptodon ensatus*, is <u>one of</u> <u>the only salamanders that makes</u> <u>a noise</u>—it will emit <u>low-pitched</u> <u>barks when threatened</u>.

The map below shows where our

slimy giant is found. There are other members of the genus *Dicamptodon* in a few other states and in British Columbia and farther north in coastal California. I first saw ours in a cubby hole between damp, mossy rocks at Camp



Redwood Glen (by the SF Y Camp) back in late 1967. Jim Mackey & Walter Colquhoun have found them at the back of the lower Trout Farm Trail in SPVP. Jim's was in San Pedro creek, Walter's on land. Another S.P. creek sighting was made on Jan. 21, 2017, by Newt Rockney.


#### DON'T MESS WITH MOTHER NATURE

The *Smithsonian Institute* tells us that today, sea level is 5 to 8 inches (13-20 cm) higher on average than it was in 1900; for the previous 2,000 yrs, sea level hadn't changed much at all. The rate of sea level rise has also increased over time. <u>Between 1900 & 1990 studies show that sea level rose between</u> <u>1.2 mm & 1.7 mm/yr on average.</u> By 2000, the rate had increased to about 3.2 mm per year and the <u>rate in 2016 is esti-</u> <u>mated at 3.4 mm per year</u>. Sea level is expected to rise even more quickly by the end of the century.

In *San Francisco Bay* many areas, as those shown below, are predicted to be inundated by 2100 due to sea level rise or a combination of subsidence & sea level rise. The latter areas are those where <u>landfills "reclaimed" the Bay</u>.

#### Don't mess with mother nature!

Map below is based on a new study by UC Berkeley & AZ State geologists, showing sea rise, (red) & subsidence/sea level rise, yellow.




